Did you know that 2018 is the year of the Dog? Well, according to the Chinese Zodiac, the year of the Earth Dog starts on February 16th. I probably would not be writing about this if it was any other animal. My favorite animal is the Dog! So, what animal is your sign? Just in case you are not into this kind of stuff, it is based on the year of your birth – See the chart above.

What does the Chinese Zodiac Horoscope have to say about your sign? Will the year of the Earth Dog (2018) be your year to shine? Or does it spell disaster? You will find out later.

The Chinese Zodiac History

The Chinese zodiac consists of twelve animals that first appeared in the Zhan Guo period [5th century B.C.]. No one knows the exact date as of when the zodiac was essentially created, but they were officially identified during the Han Dynasty [206 B.C.–9 A.D.], which was over 2000 years ago. The zodiac became a popular way to determine a person's birth year during the North Zhou Dynasty [557-581 A.D.] and is still very commonly used today. The zodiac is calculated by a cycle of sixty years in which each animal signifies a different year.

The lunar calendar paved the sequence of the Chinese zodiac animals. This calendar can be traced back to the 14th century B.C. Myths say that Emperor Huangdi, the first Chinese emperor, in 2637 B.C. invented the Chinese lunar calendar, which follows the cycles of the moon.

The zodiac was based on Chinese astrology and was used as a way to count years, months, days, and hours in the calendar. It was formed from two components: the Celestial Stem and the Terrestrial Branch. Each of the 12 animals stands for a year in a 12-year cycle, a day in the a 12-day cycle, and for every two hours in a 24-hour day. These were used to name each year along with the animal signs, but now they mainly just use the dates.

This year is the year of the Dog: 2018! You may wonder, "What does that mean?" For starters, it may be helpful to think of the Chinese zodiac as a system similar to the one in Western astrology. But instead of using the birth month and date to

determine someone's horoscope, the Chinese zodiac uses the year of birth based on the lunar calendar. The animal sign that comes with your year of birth is supposed to represent your character.

The Chinese zodiac is known as "生肖 (Shēng xiào)" in Chinese. It functions around a twelve-year cycle which rotates between these 12 animals: Rat, Ox, Tiger, Rabbit, Dragon, Snake, Horse, Sheep/Goat/Ram, Monkey, Rooster, Dog, Pig.

The Great Race: The Origin of the order of the Chinese Zodiac

There exists a story, in Chinese mythology, of a great race that decided which animals made it into the Zodiac and in what order.

The Jade Emperor, the ruler of all gods within Chinese mythology, hosted the race. To finish the race and become one of 12 animals in the calendar, the animals had to cross a river. Here's the primary interpretation of this story!



The great race loomed just on the horizon and the Cat and the Rat were best of friends. Together, the two of them hatched a plan to ride the Ox across the river together. They knew the large and hardy Ox was accustomed to crossing rivers and would likely finish first.

At the start of the race, the two animals slipped atop the Ox. Being rather thick-headed, the Ox was oblivious to the two animals atop him. But, as the Cat and the Rat rode atop the Ox, the Rat jolted abruptly forward. The sudden force sent the Cat flying off the Ox and into the river. The Cat let out a piercing hiss directed at the Rat, but by then, it was too late, and the Ox, with the Rat atop, was already too far ahead of the Cat.

Even to this this day, Cats still hold a grudge against Rats. This is why Cats hate water and chase Rats every time they see one!


Personality of each Animal

According to the Chinese zodiac, the unique personality of each animal is passed on to those born in the years it rules. The general personality characteristics for the animals are as follows:



Rat 鼠 (Shǔ)

A rat is resourceful, kind, smart, lovely, witty, alert, and spirited. The rat is timid and lacking in command skills, and therefore not fit for the role of a leader. However, their curiosity takes them far, as they are quick learners and flexible.



Ox 牛 (Niú)

The ox is a hard worker and persistent in whatever it does. As an ox, one of the things to watch for is when being too stubborn or demanding. Another characteristic is the ox's reluctance to reveal themselves to others. Most will be firm with their beliefs and experience minimal relaxation in their lives and will live long healthy lives.



Tiger 虎 (hǔ)

Competitive, brave, confident, bold, resilient, and charming, the tiger makes for a strong leader. A challenge will always be taken if offered—though the tiger can sometimes be too hot-headed. Tigers enjoy engaging in action and have abundant energy, so they stay active often and participate in sports.



Rabbit 兔 (Tù)

People born in the year of the rabbit are kind, affectionate, pure, and pleasant. However, sometimes sentiment will cause them to seem superficial. They are cautious and conservative, which will cause them to miss good opportunities. Rabbits are best known for their gentle, skillful, patient, and quiet character.



Dragon 龙 (lóng)

The dragon is known as the most vital beast in the Chinese zodiac. It is the only imaginary animal out of the twelve. Dominant, ambitious, and powerful, those born during the year of the dragon embrace challenges, tests, and risks. However, like the tiger, a dragon can be rash.



Snake 蛇 (shé)

The snake is an enigmatic animal. Snakes prefer a peaceful life with a workload that is manageable, as they are easily stressed when their lives are not in order. Intuition is the snake's strong suite, with intelligence and wisdom to come along in the package. As for the weak points, a snake is prone to procrastination, jealousy, and boredom.



Horse 号 (Mǎ)

Those born in the year of the horse live positively and are hard workers. However, stress from work and responsibility quickly weaken the horse, and therefore it is advised that those born in this year do not overwork. Socially, the horse is very pleasant, amiable, and humorous, which makes them easy to get along with. They are guaranteed popularity and a large circle of friends.



Sheep/Goat/Ram 羊 (yáng)

Sheep and Goats prefer to stay in groups, as they do not enjoy being the center of attention. They are thoughtful, honest, amicable, and gentle. Because of their calm nature, health is not often a problem—their pessimism is where they fall short.



Monkey 猴 (Hóu)

The monkey is witty, intelligent, sharp, crafty, and naughty. Sometimes their jokes and pranks can end up hurting others even though monkeys do not have bad intentions. An urban environment is definitely preferred over the rural, since the environment fits better with the monkey's abilities.



Rooster 鸡 (jī)

The rooster is observant, confident, shrewd, and hardworking. These traits can sometimes give off a negative impression to others, since roosters who often speaking their mind can come off boastful. They are social animals who enjoy attention; but this can also be a weak point of roosters, since their attention seeking can annoy others.



Dog 狗 (Gǒu)

The dog is faithful and honest but can find it hard to trust others. If one slips or breaks a promise with a dog, the relationship is immediately questioned by the dog. Additionally, dogs come off as having a stubborn personality, and are cursed with a worrisome mind. Dogs are easily liked for their loyalty and willingness to help others over themselves.



Pig 猪 (zhū)

The pig makes for a worthy companion because they are tolerant, sincere, generous, and compassionate. They are ambitious animals who set difficult goals for themselves and will work at their hardest to achieve a set goal. While doing so they do not seek for other's help very often and are cautious in their actions. This is not surprising since the pig is known for a great sense of responsibility.

Understanding the Chinese Elements Cycle

In Asian culture, there is a strong focus placed on balance. As energy flows in one direction, it ebbs in another. From Feng Shui to holistic medicine, the interactions and relationships within the universe are only harmonious when kept in balance. The Five Elements Theory, or Wu Xing, is a Chinese philosophy that is used as the basis for everything from medicine, fortune telling, martials arts and more. The five elements -- earth, metal, wood, fire, and water -- are believed to be the fundamental roots of the universe, between which all interactions occur.

Each Chinese element has its own characteristics and associations and each plays a crucial role in the balance of the universe. No element is stronger or more important than another, and each has its own defined strengths and weaknesses. According to the Five Elements Theory, all things arise from and return to the universe and are

composed of these elements. This is why understanding our own connection to them is important.

Each of the five elements stands independently, however, each influence and molds the others. The world's interactions are determined by the Chinese elements creating and destroying each other. The process of creation promotes development, while the process of destruction restrains this development. The two are complimentary processes and create a harmonious stillness when balanced. For example:



Creation:

Water feeds Wood. Wood fuels Fire. Fire makes Earth (ash). Earth produces Metal. Metal carries Water.

Destruction:


Wood separates the Earth (i.e. roots). Earth absorbs Water. Water smothers Fire. Fire melts Metal. Metal penetrates Wood.

Overprotective Stubborn Conservative -- have trouble taking risks Reserved




Metal is the diamond found in the rough -- it is the breath of life. Metal respects itself and also others. It is strong and hard but will adapt and change when put under pressure. So, aligning the five elements to the 12 animals or years of the zodiac creates 60 different combinations -- a complete cycle that lasts 60 years. I think we have enough information now to identify our zodiac animal and element.
